This is our first issue of the U-Donor Digest going out not only to our O-Negative donors, but to AB Plasma donors, as well. AB Plasma can be given to any patient, no matter their blood type, making AB Plasma donors Universal Donors.

AB Plasma donors are in high demand. Plasma is the liquid portion of the blood that carries clotting factors and proteins. Along with treating trauma patients, it is needed to treat burn victims and those battling severe liver disease and cancer.

Similar to O-Negative being the blood type of choice in trauma situations, AB Plasma is what emergency personnel choose when a trauma victim needs plasma and there is no time to determine the

patient's blood type. Those with the AB blood type may be candidates for donating plasma, platelets, or both at the same time, via an automated process called apheresis.

Donor Sees Value of Giving Blood On and Off Duty

As a surgical tech at Cox South, O-Negative blood donor Janet Nelson has a unique perspective.


"We use a lot of blood on trauma patients when they come in," she said. When seconds count and there is no time to determine the patient's blood type, O-Negative blood is used. "That's one reason I donate. I think, 'If I'm the patient, I'll need O Negative."

Janet donated blood for the first time when she was 17, and she recently hit the 11-gallon milestone. Her late mother, also a blood donor, instilled in Janet her view of the importance of giving blood.

Whether donating at CoxHealth blood drives or at CBCO's Thomson Donor Center in Springfield, Janet reminds herself to stay calm. "I don't even look when they stick me. Breathe and relax. Those are the only words of wisdom I can give people."

Janet asks other Universal Donors to consider donating or donating more often. "If they come in as a patient, they would want the blood there for them. It is almost like a civic duty. We need to have blood there for people."

Universal Donor Janet Nelson's work as a surgical tech puts her in the position to witness firsthand how vital it is to give O-Negative blood.
